We are working to improve our technology so that we can offer online/live stream services. In addition, we have refreshed our current website and are actively engaged social media. We also recognize that we have to meet people where they are and this will mean we continue to think outside of the box and get out of the physical walls of the church.

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Describe your liturgical style and practice for all types of worship services provided by your community.

In addition, we always give individuals an opportunity to try a ministry once and see if they would consider working with a team that can train them and get to know them even more.

As a worshipping community, how do you care for your spiritual, emotional and physical well-being?

At St. John's, we are a family! Yes, we may fuss, complain, or have disagreements, however, time after time, we show up for each other during times of loss, sadness, happiness, and hospitality. We try to have open dialogue to help parishioners and well as we have tried to form a walking group



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How do you engage in pastoral care for those beyond your worshipping community?

Currently we engage in pastoral care with the help and support of our Staten Island Clergies. We know that we can call upon any one of them should the need for pastoral care arise.

Describe your worshipping community's involvement in either the wider Church or geographical region.

St. John's Church is very active and involved with the Richmond Inter-Parish Council (IPC). The IPC includes Clergy, Warden and Lay Leaders who meet quarterly to discuss and provide community support, Lenten Worship, service services for Holy Days or special occasions. In addition, the IPC hosts an annual church picnic as well as have "swapped" Clergy for a day. St. John's also participates at the Diocesan level by attending the annual convention, attending webinars offered and sharing any communications from our Bishops. A few years ago, St. John's participated in INDABA.

Tell about a ministry that your worshipping community has initiated in the past five years. Who can be contacted about this?

I would say St. John's and part of Richmond Episcopal Ministry and shared clergy as well as liturgy with Church of the Ascension. We held joint Simple Soup Supper & Maundy Thursday and Good Friday Services at each other churches as well as incorporated members to participate in the service. The Rev. Bill Baker was instrumental in helping both parishes navigate this new idea and service.



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What is your practice of stewardship and how does it shape the life of your worshipping community?

Our warden recently participated in the stewardship training TENS presentation and will continue to learn more about this program to enhance our stewardship.

What is your worshipping community's experience of conflict? And how have you addressed it?

At St. John's, should conflict arise, having a conversation and listening works best. Sometimes we may not know how to express how things may affect us, especially change, however, having conversation and addressing a problem works best. It may not always be easy to hear, but it is best.

What is your experience leading/addressing change in the church? When has it gone well? When has it gone poorly? And what did you learn?

I think giving people the opportunity to hear from others or allow others to step out of their comfort zone in ministry or a new idea is beneficial to the life of the church. We just recently updated our church website and this change was different but welcoming. Our organist and choir held a fundraiser to get new hymnals, Lift Every Voice and Sing to enhance our music ministry and it was well received. I don't have a specific example of things gone poorly but I'm sure they have based on a decision that may not have been well thought out.
